What do you do?

I'm responsible for looking after the investment property owned by The Trust. The rent from these properties is used to fund the activities across our parks. This includes agreeing new lettings and working with existing tenants. I'm also responsible for buying or selling property investments to ensure we hold a balanced portfolio capable of optimising returns for The Trust.

What did you do when you left school?

I have a degree in Estate Management and am a qualified Chartered Surveyor. My whole career has been working within the property industry. I have been a Property Consultant and Head of Estates in the private sector and for another charity. Much of my career has been spent involved in the development of Milton Keynes working for national or local government agencies.
